Personal description

In your own words, describe what happened

I am David Medeiros, a TBI and stroke survivor, and CEO of ABI Resources LLC, a Medicaid ABI Waiver provider in Connecticut. Between November 21, 2023 and March 28, 2026, I filed multiple protected ADA Title II and Olmstead whistleblower complaints with the Connecticut Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities (CHRO) against the Department of Social Services (DSS). These complaints detailed serious violations in the Medicaid ABI Waiver program, including unnecessary institutionalization of disabled individuals, denial of free choice of providers (42 CFR §431.51), engineered waitlists, and retaliation against compliant providers. Instead of investigating, CHRO engaged in systematic evidence destruction and denial of reasonable accommodations. Over 50 pieces of critical evidence were destroyed or deleted under the supervision of Executive Director Tanya A. Hughes, Kimberly Morris, and Dedra A. Morris. Numerous high-importance emails containing complaints and supporting documentation were deleted “without being read” as proven by read-receipt metadata (February 2024 cluster and multiple 2025–2026 instances). This spoliation occurred in CHRO Case No. 2410220 (Medeiros v. Connecticut DSS). CHRO used my disabilities against me, refused ADA accommodations in their own process, and blocked meaningful access to civil rights remedies. This protects DSS from accountability for Olmstead violations. This is not an isolated incident. My March 13, 2026 National Olmstead Whistleblower Report and Appendix A document 100 interlocking systemic motives

showing a nationwide “closed system” in Medicaid HCBS/ABI programs. State human rights agencies destroy evidence to shield unnecessary institutionalization and diversion of hundreds of billions in federal taxpayer dollars away from community-based services for Americans with disabilities.
